






## Our Favourite Books for Preschoolers

Here are our favourite books to look at with preschoolers for stuttering therapy. To optimise your therapy time, talk about what you see in the book rather than reading the book.

Title, Author	Description	
<i>Spot</i> books by Eric Hill	A much-loved and easily available book series that supports high structure. Opening and closing flaps is always a bonus!	
<i>Dear Zoo</i> by Rod Campbell	Another lift the flap book that is fun, simple and a great starter to structured therapy.	
<i>The Very Hungry Caterpillar</i> by Eric Carle	A popular book that is great in the early stages of therapy because it is very repetitive and requires mostly naming.	
<i>Bluey</i> books	Based on the beloved ABC TV show, Bluey books offer a variety of formats (board books, lift the flap and 'where's Bluey' search and find) for structured therapy.	
<i>Magic Beach, Imagine and My Farm</i> by Alison Lester	These books have detailed drawings to stimulate lots of talking. Great for children needing little structure who may not chat on without more visual prompts.	
<i>The Farm, The Zoo and The Seaside</i> by Heather Amery and Stephen Cartwright	These books are in the Usborne Talkabout series. They offer large picture scenes that can be used for naming or for longer descriptions.	

<p><i>1001 things to spot on holiday</i> by Hazel Maskel <i>1001 things to spot on the farm</i> by Gillian Doherty <i>1001 things to spot in the town</i> by Anna Milbourne</p>	<p>This Usborne series provides scenes which can be used when very high or low structure is needed. An extra fun element is the 'search for' function.</p>	
<p><i>First Thousand Words</i> by Heather Amery and Stephen Cartwright</p>	<p>This book can be used for high structure (naming, counting and action words) to low structure (conversational prompts). Clear pictures don't strain the eye, and a puzzle feature to keep kids engaged. Available in a variety of languages.</p>	
<p><i>Where is the green sheep?</i> by Mem Fox and Judy Horacek</p>	<p>This book's repetitive, memorable and simple language make it ideal for early on in therapy, when high structure is required.</p>	
<p><i>Follow the Line through the House,</i> <i>Follow the Line to School</i> by Laura Ljungkvist</p>	<p>These 'follow the line' books encourage children to trace the story's path with their finger. They are helpful in keeping chatty children focussed.</p>	
<p><i>Where's Spidey?</i> books</p>	<p>Action-packed search and find activity books featuring the spider-man superhero. Often popular for structured therapy with the older preschoolers.</p>	
<p><i>Cars and Trucks and Things That Go</i> and other pictures books by Richard Scarry</p>	<p>Fun, search and find busy picture scenes full of interesting machines and characters to engage young children in structured therapy.</p>
